SUPPORT FOR UKRAINE

The Wrexham Leader reports that Matthew Williams, helped by his father Greg, has instigated collecting £6,000 to buy a 4x4 vehicle and drive it to Ukraine for it to be used as an evacuation vehicle for the wounded at the frontline, in a scheme promoted by the charity DrivingUkraine.

The article declares that his interest grew from members of our "Llay and Rossett" parish, hosting Ukrainian refugees, and on learning first-hand the distressing stories of hardship and loss, he wanted to find a way he could help.

They raised the funds to buy the vehicle and after its full service drove it, with a team of other vehicles, to hand it over in Odessa on 1st May; they're now back home, safe and sound.

FATIMA

May has been set aside for centuries as the month of Mary, Mother of God, and in 1917 she appeared to three shepherd children in Fatima in Portugal on six occasions between 13th May and 13th October, urging the children to pray the Rosary.

Fatima has since become a major pilgrimage centre, dedicated, as is Lourdes in France, to the honour of Our Lady.

The shrine receives about five million pilgrims every year and several Popes have visited: Paul VI in 1967, John Paul II in 1982, 1991 and 2000, Benedict XVI in 2010 and Francis in 2017 and 2023. The shrine accommodated half a million during each of the recent Popes' visits.

Do pray the Rosary as implored by Our Lady if you can, and it will be prayed in church before each Sunday 10:00 Mass throughout the month, led by Geraldine Downing.

HCPT – fundraising for 2026

HCPT is a registered charity offering pilgrimage holidays, to Lourdes in the south of France, for disabled and disadvantaged people from around the UK and further afield. The letters "HCPT" stand for the Hosanna House and Children's Pilgrimage Trust.

Every Easter around 1,000 disabled and disadvantaged children enjoy a fun and safe week in Lourdes, staying in hotels with their volunteer helpers.

The Wrexham Diocese HCPT group – "Group 155" – organise a trip to take a small group of children every two years to this amazing event.

There was a bit of disruption to this due to COVID – a group was supposed to go in 2020, but this was obviously not possible, and it took until 2024 for the group to get back up and running. Helen Zammit-Willson of our parish was one of the helpers that year and found it an inspirational experience.

Planning is now underway to raise funds to organise the 2026 event – which will be the 70th anniversary of HCPT – and so will be even extra special.

As you will see from the article from St Joseph's Catholic and Anglican High School, Year 7 raise funds for this charity every year. And with their help the group has already raised £10k towards to a target of £20k that is needed.

There is a poster and other information at the back of Church about HCPT, together with a collection box for any ad hoc donations – and a coffee morning is planned for 15 June after our 10am Mass in the hall.
